A National Champion mountain dulcimer player, Joe began playing the mountain dulcimer in the late 70s in coffeehouses, churches, and schools. He has written several books of dulcimer music, produced CDs, and has performed across the country in a number of different venues. In September of 2007, he won the title of National Champion at Winfield, KS. Joe loves working with and performing for people. Nancy Galambush, Snow Hill NC



Please consider your skill level when choosing a class. The instructors will be teaching at the level listed in the description. We make this request because instructors cannot meet the needs of their students if there is a wide range of abilities in the class.

SKILL LEVEL DEFINITIONS:

Beginner

The student may have never touched a dulcimer prior to class and need not have any musical background. The Beginner student may also have recently begun playing but want to be sure they are using good form and to be clear on their basic skills before continuing. Instruction will include how to hold the instrument, how to tune it, how strum a steady rhythm, play back up chords and play several tunes.

<u>Advanced Beginner</u>

The student knows how to tune the dulcimer using an electronic tuner, hold a pick and strum, although may need help in keeping a steady rhythm or in using more complex rhythms. The student should be able to quickly find frets 0 through 7 and should be able to play several tunes.

Intermediate

The student should be able to use several strum patterns, be able to play two and three finger basic chords for the key of D, be able to follow tablature at a basic level and be familiar with the fretboard beyond the 7th fret

Morning classes CHOOSE ONE

- 1) **Beginners** This class continues all day. (Do not sign up for other classes if you sign up for Beginners.) Which side of the dulcimer is up? How do you tune it? It's easy. You'll be playing tunes in no time. You won't leave without information on how you can continue to play after the workshop. You do not need a musical background or to be able to read music. You may also wish to take this class if you have started to learn the dulcimer but want to be sure that you have the basics right. Skills which will be taught include how to: hold the instrument in your lap, hold a pick, do a basic "Bum-dit-ty" strum, an easy way to finger the basic chords needed to play most dulcimer tunes and get a start on learning tunes for your repertoire. This is a wonderful opportunity to see if you are really interested in playing a dulcimer without investing in an instrument. - 2) Advanced Beginners Smooth out your strumming and get that rhythm right! After learning to play easy melodies, students at the advanced beginner level often need some help keeping an even rhythm and feeling comfortable with their strumming. This class covers rhythms used in fiddle tunes, as well as other rhythms used in waltzes or hymns/gospel music. Depending on the needs of the students, this class may also cover other advanced beginner techniques, such as using more than one finger on the left hand, using basic chords and reading basic musical notation. ADVANCED BEGINNER. Barbara Strickland and Susan Hanks, Instructors.
- **3) Froggy Went a Chording.** Froggy Went a-Chording is a workshop to help you play chords effectively and efficiently. It covers both inverted and non-inverted chords and how to move from one to the other. Introduces plenty of exercises to help you be more consistent with chords. The workshop is a combination of two workshops Joe has been teaching for years: "Focusing on the Majors" and "Playing Upside Down." INTERMEDIATE LEVEL, Joe Collins, Instructor.
- **4) Smoothing Out Your Playing.** You can play the dulcimer...this workshop will explore some right and left hand concepts and techniques to improve the smoothness and fluidity of your playing! Sometimes, breaking old habits is harder than making new ones! You will get some exercises for practice and building muscle memory, and we will apply these concepts and techniques to a variety of great tunes! PLEASE BRING A CAPO. - **5) Keep It Interesting.** Don't bore your audience or yourself by playing a tune over and over. Learn how to add interest to a tune and make your own arrangement. BRING A CAPO (a few available for loan). INTERMEDIATE Nancy Galambush, Instructor.

Afternoon Classes Session 1 - Choose 1

- 6) Classic Hymns for the Mountain Dulcimer Let's learn these arrangements of classic hymns. These include modern standards like "Just as I Am," but also some old Gospel tunes like "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder." A few other tunes will round it out and build your repertoire to use at church, nursing homes, or wherever you are called to go and play! INTERMEDIATE LEVEL Joe Collins, Instructor
- 7) Waltzes in D. The mountain dulcimer makes a perfect partner for beautiful waltzes! In this workshop we'll review some key elements for playing waltzes, and explore some techniques to enhance the feeling of these beautiful melodies. And we'll play a couple of these great tunes. Come dance with your dulcimer! ADVANCED BEGINNER LEVEL Jeff Furman, Instructor
- **8) Irish Dance Time.** What is the difference between a Reel, a Slip Jig and a Hornpipe? Find out and learn one of each. Includes some work on Hammer-ons and Pull-offs Bring a capo. INTERMEDIATE AND UP Nancy Galambush, Instructor

Afternoon classes Session 2 - Choose one

- 9) Appalachian Mountain Songs for Advanced Beginners
- Simple songs played and loved in the Appalachian Mountains easily accessible to beginners. Includes songs like "Fair & Tender Ladies," "Sourwood Mountain," "Wayfaring Stranger," and others. ADVANCED BEGINNERS, Joe Collins, Instructor
- **10) Songs of Stephen Foster.** Stephen Foster remains one of the most beloved and prolific American songwriters. His timeless music and lyrics are still widely played and sung, more than 150 years after his death. In this workshop we will play several of his tunes less commonly played, but no less beautiful or impactful, and explore the power of his compositions. PLEASE BRING A CAPO! INTERMEDIATE, Jeff Furman, Instructor
- **11) Welsh Hymns** "I Will Sing of My Redeemer", "Love Devine, All Loves Excelling", and "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus" are all sung to the tune "Hyfrydol." We will learn to play Hyfrydol in the key of D, then add a bit of interest by segueing into G, without using a capo. Cwm Rhondda is known as both "God of Grace and God of

Glory" and also "Guide Me, O, Thou Great Redeemer" and is sometimes referred to as "Bread of Heaven". It is also considered by many to be the informal Welsh anthem and has been played at British state weddings and funerals. INTERMEDIATE LEVEL Nancy Galambush, Instructor.
